BACKGROUND



Leger monitors constituents' views of BC government performance, party leadership, and voter intentions to keep a pulse on provincial political sentiment.

As the 2024 BC provincial election draws near, Leger plans to repeatedly administer this survey on a weekly basis to provide upto-date polling and insights related to the upcoming election.

METHODOLOGY



- Results are based on online research conducted among BC residents 18 years of age and older, October 14-15, 2024.
- The most recent wave was conducted among a sample of 1,017.
 - No margin of error can be associated with a nonprobability sample, but for comparative purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error of +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was statistically weighted according to Canadian Census figures for age, gender, region, and education within the Province.
- Where available, results are compared to the previous wave's results using green/red coloured arrows.
- Where relevant, subgroup results are compared against the total (excluding the subgroup in question) using green/red coloured text.
- Some charts and tables may not add to 100% due to rounding.


DASHBOARD OF KEY METRICS



BC Voting Intentions Among Decided Voters

The BC NDP continues to hold the lead in voting intention among decided voters and sit 4 percentage points ahead of The Conservative Party ahead of this weekend's election.





Key Findings


- The BC NDP (46%) continues to hold the lead in voting intention among decided voters over The Conservative Party of BC (42%) with a slightly narrower 4-point lead from last week and despite Furstenau's debate performance, the Greens have held steady at 9%.
- · The NDP has picked up support in the Metro Vancouver area (42% to 49%) in the past three weeks, and the Conservatives have continued their gains in areas of BC outside of Metro Vancouver and Vancouver Island (to 49%).
- Voters 55+ continue to support the NDP over the Conservative Party of BC by a 13 pt. margin (51% to 37%) while Conservative support is highest among males (47%) and 35-54's (47%). While Conservative support dropped substantially last week among youth and women, it has recovered slightly this week.
- A considerable number (37%) of BC residents have already voted with heavy turnout from the 55+ group (49%) and lower numbers among 35-54 (33%) and 18-34 (23%)--with early results favouring the BC NDP.
- Eby edged out Rustad as the winner of the leader's debate (27% to 25%) with Furstenau a distant third (14%)--and a substantial 34% not having an opinion.

The BC NDP continues to hold the lead in voting intention among decided voters over The Conservative Party of BC. The incumbent government now sits 4 percentage points ahead of the Conservative Party, not a significant change over last week's poll.

The BC Greens continue to hold stable in a distant third place despite Furstenau's debate performance.

The NDP has retained about 75% of voters from the last provincial election, and picked up 28% of past Liberal voters as well as 27% of Green voters

The Conservative Party of BC only picked up two-thirds of past Liberal voters



PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS OVER TIME



GENDER (Among Decided Voters)









AGE (Among Decided Voters)



REGION (Among Decided Voters)












PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS OVER TIME

(Among Total BC Residents)








LIKELIHOOD OF VOTING

Nearly four-in-ten (37%) BC residents indicate they have already voted, while just less than one-third (32%) will 'definitely vote', for a total of 69% who have already voted or will 'definitely vote'.

NDP voters are significantly more likely to indicate that they have already voted.



Just above a quarter (27%) of BC residents believe that NDP leader David Eby was the 'winner' of the leader's debate, while an additional quarter (25%) consider Conservative Party leader John Rustad the 'winner'.

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
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
