Methodology

Study Population

• Canadian residents, ages 18 and older.

Data Collection

- A total of n=1501 online surveys were conducted via Leger's online LEO panel.
- Interviews were conducted from June 30 to July 3, 2022

Statistical Analysis

- As a non-probability online survey, a margin of error is technically not to be reported.
- If the data were collected through a probability sample, the margin of error would be (n=1501) ±2.5%, 19 times out of 20.
- Using data from the 2021 Census, results were weighted according to age, gender, and region in order to ensure a representative sample of the population.
- The numbers presented have been rounded to the nearest whole number. However, raw values were used to calculate the sums presented and therefore may not correspond to the manual addition of these numbers.



Over half of Canadians support extending MAID to 'mature minors'

Medical assistance in dying (MAID) has been available to adult Canadians since 2016. The law allows Canadians who have incurable and terminal medical conditions to opt to end their life with the assistance of a medical professional. This law is currently undergoing review. One consideration is whether to extend MAID to those under the age of 18 (minors) who display a certain level of maturity and decision-making ability. Would you support or oppose extending the right for a 'mature minor' to ask for and receive medical assistance to end their own life if confronted with an incurable medical condition?

Regionally, support for MAID's extension to 'mature minors' is noticeably higher in Quebec (65%) compared to the ROC (47%)



Support for extending MAID to 'mature minors' falls to just less than 4 in 10 if parents or guardians were opposed to the decision

Regionally, support for MAID's extension to 'mature minors' even if parents oppose is higher in Quebec (46%) and Alberta (44%)





Over two-thirds of Canadians support allowing adults the ability to request MAID in advance of a worsening cognitive condition

Another change associated with medical assistance in dying (MAID) is whether adults should have the ability to request MAID in advance of a condition that, as it progresses will impair their cognitive, decision-making ability. This would be conditions such as Alzheimer's or other forms of dementia. Should people with these conditions be able to request MAID in advance of their condition becoming terminal? 
