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1. Study Highlights

One out of two Canadians feels it is easier to meet new people today.

Fear of the unknown dominate perceptions of online dating services, mainly among women.



2. Results

2.1 One out of two Canadians considers it is easier to meet new people today

For 51% of Canadians, it is easier to meet people today than it was ten years ago. On the other hand, more than a third (37%) of Canadians are of the opposite opinion and 12% did not have an opinion on the subject.



Proportion of Canadians who consider it is easier to meet new people today

Men (56%) are more likely than women (47%) to say that meeting new people is easier than it was ten years ago. The same goes for Canadians between 18 and 24 years of age (71%), residents of Quebec (56%) and students (66%).

Inversely, women (41% vs. 32% of men), Francophones (42%), people with a lower income (45%) and Canadians with an elementary education (52%) seem to experience more difficulty meeting new people compared to ten years ago.

2.2 The arrival of new means of communication: a major advantage when it comes to meeting new people

Close to half (44%) of respondents consider the arrival of new means of communication as one of the most important factors in improving the chances of meeting new people in the last ten years.

Other secondary factors also help to explain why it is easier to make new friends: the fact that there still are local places and areas where you can meet people (18%), the desire people have to expand their usual circle of friends (11%) and the fact that a stronger proportion of people work (6%).

Respondents between 18 and 24 (53%) and between 25 and 34 (53%), residents of the Atlantic Provinces (71%), people whose gross annual household income is between \$40 000 and \$59 999 (54%) as well as professionals (54%) are more likely to perceive the arrival of new means of communications as a major advantage for meeting new people.

2.3 People's indifference and lack of time are the main impediments to meeting new people

Two main reasons compromise the process: the indifference of people in general (26%) and the lack of time (24%).

To a lesser extent, the arrival of new means of communication (11%) and the lack of suitable places to meet new people (9%) also contribute to the difficulty of making new friends.

There are more men (16%) who perceive the arrival of new means of communication as an impediment to meeting new people.

2.4 Those who use chat rooms and online dating services are characterized as modern and open-minded

For nearly half (45%) of Canadians, people who log on to chat rooms and/or use online dating services are modern (24%) and open-minded (21%).

Also, close to a quarter (23%) of respondents feel that those who use chat room and/or online dating services are solitary (13%) or strange (10%).

The proportion of Canadians who think that those who use this type of service are courageous is 10%. Conversely, 4% of respondents think that these Web site users are fearful.

Canadians between 25 and 34 years of age (29%), Anglophones (26%), residents of Ontario (28%), Canadians whose gross annual household income is \$80 000 or more (31%) and professionals (29%) are among respondents who view chat room and/or online dating service users as modern.

Women (15%), Francophones (27%), residents of Quebec (26%), Canadians whose gross annual household income is between \$40 000 and \$59 999 (20%) and homemakers (21%) are more likely to qualify chat room or online dating service users as solitary.



2.5 Fear of the unknown dominates perceptions of online dating services, mainly among women

Eight out of ten Canadians (80%) consider that chat rooms and online dating are dangerous since you do not know with whom you are dealing. The proportion of respondents who reject this assertion is 14%.

There are clearly more women (83%) than men (77%) who perceive the anonymity of chat rooms and online dating as being more dangerous.

Moreover, Canadians between 55 and 64 years of age (90%), employees in sales, services or office workers (86%) and homemakers (90%) are among the most likely to distrust these Web sites.

Close to two out of three Canadians (65%) think the Internet makes it easier to meet people. On the other hand, 26% are of the opposite opinion and 9% did not express an opinion on the subject.

In particular, Canadians between 25 and 34 years of age (75%) and manual workers (73%) recognize that the Internet makes the process of meeting people easier.

More than half (53%) of Canadians believe that people who log onto chat rooms or use online dating services do not dare admit that they do so, though more than a third (35%) of respondents reject this assertion. Moreover, 12% did not give their opinion on the subject.

The impression that people who log onto chat rooms or online dating services are not willing to admit that they do so is noticeably more pronounced among Canadians between 55 and 64 years of age (61%), Francophones (59%), residents of Quebec (60%) and people with a high school education (58%).

Finally, opinions are divided when it comes to the good faith of those who use chat rooms and online dating services. Thus, 46% of Canadians think that, unlike what many believe, people who log on to chat rooms and use online dating services are very often sincere about the process. On the other hand, 42% do not share this view.

Canadians between 55 and 64 years of age (53%), Anglophones (52%), residents of Alberta (54%), Canadians whose gross annual household income is \$80 000 and over (55%), professionals (52%) and people with a university education (54%) are among those who perceive good faith among chat room and online dating service users.

2.6 Meeting people over the Internet: not a very popular practice among Canadian women

In total, more than two-thirds (69%) of Canadians reject the Internet as a way of meeting new people, close to half (47%) assert that they would completely rule out using the Internet to make new friends.

Categorical rejection of using the Internet to meet new people is distinctly more pronounced among women (56%) than it is among men (38%).

The same goes for Canadians between 45 and 54 (53%), between 55 and 64 (60%) and 65 years of age or older (69%), Anglophones (50%), homemakers (64%) retired people (65%), and also Canadians with an elementary education (66%).

The proportion of Canadians who would consider the possibility of meeting people through the intermediary of the Internet is 28%.

Men (34%), Canadians between 18 and 24 (51%) and between 25 and 34 (41%), Allophones (35%), manual workers (33%), professionals (32%) and students (43%) are more open to making new friends over the Internet.



2.7 Seven out of ten Canadians surfed the net in the last month

Nearly three-quarters (71%) of Canadians have used the Internet for personal and/or professional reasons during the month of June 2004.

As opposed to residents in other provinces, there were more Ontarians (75%) surfing the net this past month. Inversely, residents of Quebec (63%) were proportionately less likely to use the Internet in June 2004.

Moreover, Internet use in June 2004 is mainly observed among men (75%), Canadians between 18 and 24 (84%), between 25 and 34 (89%), and between 35 and 44 (80%), Anglophones (75%), Canadians whose gross annual household income is between \$60 000 and \$79 999 (84%) or \$80 000 or more (92%), employees in sales, services or office workers (84%), professionals (91%), students (93%), and also Canadians with a college (81%) or university (86%) education.

3. Methodology

This study was conducted by Leger Marketing through telephone interviews among a representative sample of 1500 English- or French-speaking Canadians, 18 years of age or older.

The interviews were conducted from our Montreal and Winnipeg call centres between July 6 and July 11, 2004. Up to ten call-backs were made in the case of non-response.

Using data from Statistics Canada, the results were weighted according to geographic location, gender and language spoken at home to ensure a sample representative of the entire Canadian adult population. In the end, the maximum margin of error obtained for a sample of 1500 respondents is \pm 2.6, 19 times out of 20.
