# Postmedia Study – September 2021

Opinions on the upcoming federal election

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## Methodology



Online surveys with British Columbia residents were conducted via Leger's online panel, LEO.



From September 10-12,2021



1000 residents of BC that are 18 years of age or older



Using data from the 2016 Census, results were weighted according to, age, gender, and region in order to ensure a representative sample of the population in British Columbia.



No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample. However, for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 1000 respondents would have a margin of error of ±3.1%, 19 times out of 20.





## **Key findings**

#### In BC, the 2021 Federal Election remains a three-way race.

- 31% say they will vote for the CPC, while 30% say they will vote for the LPC, and 29% intend to vote for the NDP. Only 4% intend on voting for the Green Party of Canada.
- Compared to Canadians overall, intention to vote for NDP is stronger in BC (20% nationally vs 29% provincially), and the race is closer between the LPC and CPC (both 32%).

#### NDP continues to be the preferred second choice for voters

• 28% of British Columbians who intend on voting for a party other than the NDP would vote for the NDP if they could not vote for their preferred party.

#### Voters are more likely to vote for their preferred party than they are for the party's leader.

- 34% support the party more than its leader, 43% support both the party and the leader, but only 19% support the leader more than the party.
- CPC voters say they support the party more than the leader.

#### Most choose their second-choice party based upon if the party addresses issues important to them.

53% say their second choice party is based upon if the party addresses issues important to them, followed by 30% that say they are voting strategically.

#### The cost of living and the effects of rising inflation are the issues most important to British Columbians.

• When asked what is most important to BC'ers and what is least important, the cost of living and the effects of rising inflation is the number one issue.



## **Key findings**

#### Most British Columbians who are voting intend to vote in person, either on the day of or in advance.


- 37% say they will vote in advance at assigned polling station, and 31% say they will vote on election day at assigned polling station. 17% will vote by mail.
- Those in Vancouver, the Lower Mainland, and Vancouver Island over-index on voting by mail compared to other BC'ers.

Half of BC'ers are less likely to vote for their intended party if the local candidate is involved in buying and selling properties for real estate speculation or real estate flipping.

• 52% say they are less likely to vote for their preferred party's candidate if they discover they are involved in buying and selling properties for real estate speculation or real estate.

British Columbians are split on who they think can bring Canada together best as a country, with Singh and Trudeau both tied for the top spot


• 27% say Singh or Trudeau could best bring Canada together best as a country.






The LPC and CPC receive similar support with voters nationally, showing much less intention to vote NDP than provincially in BC. Amongst decided voters in British Columbia, it continues to be a three-way race between the Liberals, the NDP and CPC.


BCH2. If a FEDERAL election were held today, for which political party would you be most likely to

In British Columbia, voters are more likely to vote for their preferred party than they are for the party's leader.





Those intending to vote for the CPC are more likely to support the party more than Toole, whereas LPC supporters are more likely to support Trudeau over the LPC. NDP voters say they support both the NDP and Singh equally.





## MaxDiff Methodology



Using an advanced analytics technique **called MaxDiff**, respondents were surveyed and asked to make trade-offs on the importance of issues. This method calculates the relative importance of key issues, because respondents must make tough choices between competing priorities—what is most important to them and what is least important.


With the MaxDiff methodology, the percentage given to each option is the relative importance of that issue out of 100%. For example, an issue that scores 10% is twice as important to voters as an issue getting 5%.



Which issues are most important to British Columbians?



The cost of living and the effects of rising inflation are the issues most important to British Columbians and Canadians overall. Relatively, British Columbians are more concerned with housing affordability.

Not surprisingly, those intending to vote Liberal, NDP, or CPC all rate certain issues higher that are more in-line with each of the parties' policies. Regionally, Vancouverites care more about managing the 4<sup>th</sup> and subsequent waves of the pandemic, and increasing funding for healthcare services.





Half of BC'ers are less likely to vote for their intended party if the local candidate is involved in buying and selling properties for real estate speculation or real estate flipping.





Those intending to vote NDP are less likely to vote for a local candidate if they discover they are involved in real estate flipping or own two or more residential properties. Potential CPC voters are not as likely to sway their vote based off housing and real-estate factors.


