METHODOLOGY





On behalf of Global Public Affairs, Leger surveyed British Columbians to explore their perspectives on and experiences with forest fires and floods in British Columbia. The survey explored:

- To what extent British Columbians followed the news about fires and floods in 2021
- Whether they were personally impacted, and to what extent
- Their level of concern about future disasters
- How well they felt different levels of government responded not, and in the future



From Mar 4th to 6th, 2022 with n=1,000 residents of BC that are 18 years of age or older were surveyed via Leger's online panel, LEO.



Using data from the 2016 Census, results were weighted according to, age, gender, and region in order to ensure a representative sample of the population in British Columbia.



No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample. However, for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 1,000 respondents would have a margin of error of ±3.1%, 19 times out of 20. In this report, data in **bold red** characters indicate a significantly lower proportion than that of other respondents. Conversely, data in **bold green** characters indicate a significantly higher proportion that that of other respondents.




Key Findings

- 39% of British Columbians have been personally impacted by either a forest fire (27%) or flood (29%) in 2021
 - Even more (51%) residents living in areas outside of Metro Vancouver and Vancouver Island have been impacted by at least one of these events. The top ways that residents are being impacted are delays in purchase or services and having to change travel plans or vacation plans
 - Approximately three-quarters of British Columbians were following the 2021 events closely
- There is a high level of concern about these types of natural events having a personal impact this year
 - 60% of BC adults are concerned about forest fires and 50% are concerned about flooding this season
- Despite the level of concern, only one-third feel prepared for these types of natural disasters
 - Those living in regions of BC that are more likely to have been impacted by forest fires or floods in the
 past (Interior and Northern BC) feel more prepared for future instances of these events than those living
 in Metro Vancouver
- BC Residents provide mediocre ratings for Provincial/Municipal and Federal governments on handling these disasters, and even lower scores for future preparedness
 - The provincial and local municipal governments are viewed to have done a better job of handling the 2021 floods and forest fires (50%+) than the federal government (37%)
 - Residents are divided on whether various levels of government are prepared for the upcoming season





INFORMATION & PERSONAL IMPACT OF 2021'S FLOODS AND WILDFIRES IN BC




IMPACT OF 2021'S FOREST FIRES AND FLOODS IN BC









LEVEL OF PERSONAL CONCERN AND PREPAREDNESS FOR FOREST FIRES AND FLOODS IN UPCOMING YEAR



PERCEIVED PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT 2021 RESPONSE % FUTURE PREPAREDNESS


BASED ON PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTION
