#### **BACKGROUND**



Leger monitors constituents' views of BC government performance, party leadership, and voter intentions to keep a pulse on provincial political sentiment.

This wave of the study was done in partnership with Global Public Affairs.



### **METHODOLOGY**




- Results are based on online research conducted among British Columbian adults 18 years of age and older.
- The most recent wave was conducted among a sample of 1,001, with fieldwork September 15-18, 2023.
  - No margin of error can be associated with a nonprobability sample, but for comparative purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error of +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was statistically weighted according to Canadian Census figures for age, gender and region within the Province.
- Where available, results are compared to previous waves of research.


#### **Most Important Issue Facing BC**

While not out of line with historical levels, concerns about housing affordability have increased significantly since January 2023. Concern about health care and inflation/rising interest has fallen relative to Jan 2023, but these two issues are still the second and third most important in the minds of BC residents.



#### **Leader Approval Ratings**

Approval ratings and opinion changes reveal Eby remains in a very solid position, though he has seen increased levels of worsened opinion of late. New Conservative leader John Rustad continues the trend of increased approval ratings for his party in Sep 2023.



#### **Approval Ratings of Current Government on Key Issues**

While the current government's approval ratings for their handling of key issues have stayed relatively consistent since Jan 2023, disapproval ratings have increased significantly for a number of issues in that timeframe.



#### **BC Voting Intentions**

Voting intention for the current government is consistent with results from Jan 2023, with the NDP still holding a commanding lead over the others. BC United has fallen to a distant third place while the Conservative Party has made massive gains, moving into second place.


Males and those aged 18-34 or 55+ are significantly more likely to hold positive views about the direction of the province, while those living on Vancouver Island are significantly more likely to be strongly positive relative to the rest of the province.

Females and those aged 35-54 are significantly more likely to believe that the province is off on the wrong track, with those aged 35+ being statistically more likely to report strong negative feelings about the direction of the province.

### **CURRENT TRAJECTORY OF BC**

38% of British Columbians believe that things in the province are going in the right direction.


Those aged 18-34 or 55+ and males are significantly more likely to hold this view


# BC ISSUES - MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED - TRACKER

Housing affordability remains the top issue in BC, with a significantly higher number of respondents reporting it as the top issue in Sep 2023 vs. Jan 2023.

Health care and inflation/rising interest rates have fallen in importance since Jan 2023, but still round out the top 3 issues British Columbians believe to be most important.

Beyond these top three, environment/climate change has experienced an increase in importance since Jan 2023, while homelessness and COVID-19 have fallen in importance.


# Housing affordability remains the top issue in BC with nearly half of respondents reporting it as the first or second most important issue the province is currently facing.

Inflation/rising interest rates and health care are also important issues in BC, with more than a quarter of respondents believing them to be the first or second most important issue.

Following a particularly bad 2023 wildfire season, nearly one-in-ten British Columbians identify wildfires as an issue of top importance in the province.










Longer-term trending shows how much issues tend to bounce around over time as priorities, economic pressures and issues shift in BC, though housing prices/affordability has consistently led all


Environment/climate change has increased significantly in importance in the minds of British Columbians since Jan 2023.

### **CURRENT LEADER APPROVAL RATING**





Premier David Eby receives the highest approval rating of the leaders in Sep 2023 at 47%. Still, with 21% unable to provide a rating (compared to John Horgan's 10% in 2021), Eby has ground to cover to make sure he is known to all British Columbians.


Furstenau's approval rating continues to drop from the high recorded two years previous, and a lack of familiarity continues to be an issue for her (39% were not able to provide an answer). Falcon likewise suffers from a lack of recognition – 31% did not know enough about him to provide a rating. Of those that did, only 26% approved of his performance as leader.

Newcomer John Rustad received the lowest approval rating at 23%; a slight increase from the 18% approval recorded last wave by ex-leader Trevor Bolin. Rustad received by far the lowest level of understanding, with 42% unable to provide him with a rating.




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# LEADER APPROVAL RATING Longer Term Tracking



### **PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS**

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NDP voting intention appears to have fallen slightly since the last wave, though they still lead all parties by a strong margin.

Support for the BC Conservatives Party has increased massively since Jan 2023, with the party having its highest voting intention level since the tracker began.


BC United voting intention has declined significantly since Jan 2023 despite the name change, and the party has fallen into third place behind the Conservative Party.

The BC Green Party saw similar results to last wave in terms of voting intention, with their overall voting intention levels sitting well below the highpoint recorded in May 2021.



#### PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS x GENDER



#### PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS x AGE






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
#### PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS x REGION

(Among Decided Voters)











(Among Decided Voters)






Nearly two-thirds of British Columbians were aware that the BC Liberal Party changed their name to the BC United Party last April.

Those residing in Metro Vancouver and on Vancouver Island, those aged 55+, and males are significantly more likely to report being aware of the name change.

Those residing outside of Metro Vancouver and Vancouver Island, those aged 18-54, and females are significantly more likely to report not being aware of the name change.

# **AWARENESS OF NAME-CHANGE FROM BC** LIBERAL PARTY TO BC UNITED PARTY



33% of British Columbians were NOT AWARE that the BC Liberal Party changed their name to the BC United Party last April.

63% of British Columbians were AWARE that the BC Liberal Party changed their name to the BC United Party last April.


### **CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS**

Public opinion of Premier David Eby has worsened since Jan 2023, with significantly fewer British Columbians reporting an improved opinion of the leader than in the last wave.

All four party leaders reported negative NET change in opinion over the last six months, with the BC United party leading this drop in NET opinion.


A significantly greater number of British Columbians reported a worsened opinion of Kevin Falcon in Sep 2023 than in Jan 2023.

New Conservative Party leader John Rustad received the second highest rate of improved opinion amongst all party leaders and tied for the lowest rate of worsened opinion.



# **CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS Longer Term Tracking of Parties**






Trends in approval ratings for the NDP government are relatively consistent with Jan 2023 results, with the management of BC's crown corporations and housing prices/affordability being the only issues to experience significant drops in approval ratings since January.

The government's response to the BC wildfires received the highest approval ratings among all issues, whereas their handling of housing prices/affordability received the highest level of disapproval.





**ISSUES (cont.)** 




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The way Eby's government has handled the BC healthcare system has received an increasing level of disapproval since Jun 2020, with levels more than doubling since in that period.

The government's efforts in addressing the opioid/drug crisis, crime/public safety, and homelessness have experienced fluctuating levels of approval since Jun 2019, but overall, disapproval with how the government is handling these issues has been trending upwards since that time.


### **BC WILDFIRE IMPACTS**

While less than a third of British Columbians report being affected by the BC wildfires when asked plainly, just less than six in ten reported different ways that the wildfires have impacted them when aided.


More than four in ten British Columbians reported that they limited their time outdoors to avoid the poor air quality, while nearly two in ten reported direct negative impacts on their health.

Those aged 18-34 and those located outside of Metro Vancouver and Vancouver Island were more likely to report that they were impacted by the wildfires without being aided by possible impacts.

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
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
