Methodology





Web survey using computer-assisted Web interviewing (CAWI) technology.



From February 17-19, 2023.



1521 Canadian residents, 18 years of age or older, randomly recruited from LEO's online panel.



Using data from the 2021 Census, results were weighted according to region, age and gender within Canada, as well as by education and presence of children in the household in order to ensure a representative sample of the population.



For comparison purposes, a probability sample of 1521 respondents would have a margin of error of ± 2.5%, 19 times out of 20.



Half (53%) say they or their family has been **personally affected by the war in Ukraine** to some extent; 24% have been greatly or moderately affected.




Men (vs. women) and Quebecers (vs. the rest of Canada) are most likely to be personally affected by the war in Ukraine.

A strong majority of Canadians back Ukraine in the war, with support highest among those aged 55+ and who indicate they have been affected by the war. That said, one in four Canadians support neither country in the conflict or are unsure who to support.

Canadians are more supportive of the Canadian government taking non-military actions to support Ukraine as opposed to increased military aid. Actions such as sanctions and seizure of assets are areas where Canadians want to see the government do more. There is less enthusiasm for more military support or the resettlement of war refugees. In a March 2022 Leger poll, 78% of Canadian agreed Canada should welcome Ukrainian immigration through an expedited process. It would appear many Canadians feel this has been accomplished.




More than two-thirds (67%) agree **Ukraine** is only the beginning when it comes to future Russian aggression and its attempt at territorial expansion using force and 58% believe that if it wasn't for the actions by the West, Russia would be already moving military into other European countries such as Poland, Hungary, and the Baltic state countries.



Canadians aged 55+ are significantly more likely to agree that Ukraine is just the beginning and that if not for the actions of Canada, the U.S., and Europe, Russian would already be moving into other countries.

Many Canadians feel that there will be no clear winner in the Ukraine war; 29% believe sporadic fighting will continue for years with Russian occupation continuing and 12% predict a ceasefire that will end fighting, with Russia occupying parts of Ukraine indefinitely. However, 17% see Ukraine winning and Russia withdrawing and 6% believe Russia will eventually win with a pro-Russian government taking over. However, 35% admit they don't know what to expect. In a March 2022 Leger poll, 33% predicted a Ukraine victory, 27% said Russia would win, and 41% were unsure. Two-thirds (64%) agreed that the conflict could last for many years. Q6. Men are significantly more likely to feel Ukraine will emerge victorious, along with Western Canadians. Those aged 18-34 are more likely to predict a win for Russia country, although Quebecers are least likely to agree with this outcome.

Detailed Methodology



Sampling Frame

Participants were randomly selected from LEO's online panel.

Leger owns and manages an Internet panel that includes more than 450,000 Canadians coast to coast. An online panel consists of Web users profiled according to different demographic variables. The majority of Leger's panel members (60%) were randomly recruited over the phone in the past ten years, which makes this panel very similar to the current Canadian population on a number of demographic characteristics. Moreover, 35% of panelists were recruited through affiliate programs and 5% through partner campaigns and programs.

To be eligible, respondents were required to be 18 years of age or older.
