

# **Government of Alberta Report Card**

April 2024







## BACKGROUND



Leger monitors constituents' views of Alberta government performance, party leadership, and voter intentions to keep a pulse on provincial political sentiment.


- METHODOLOGY
- Results are based on online research conducted among Albertan adults 18 years of age and older.
- The most recent wave was conducted among a sample of 1,002, with fieldwork from March 22-24, 2024.
  - No margin of error can be associated with a nonprobability sample, but for comparative purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error of +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was statistically weighted according to Canadian Census figures for age, gender, region, and education within the Province.


#### **Most Important Issues**

Concerns about health care, inflation/rising interest rates, housing prices/affordability, and the economy continue to be most prominent in Alberta as of March 2024. Healthcare has become the most important issue as of March 2024, with the proportion of Albertans citing it increasing significantly.



#### Leader Approval Ratings

The NDP and Danielle Smith both receive similarly high approval ratings while the remainder of Alberta party leaders struggle with low recognition and approval under 20%.



#### **Approval Ratings of Current Government on Key Issues**

Approval ratings for the current UCP government on their handling of various issues are mixed, but overall are lower than the parties' leader approval rating.



#### **Alberta Voting Intentions**

The United Conservative Party holds a slight lead over the second place Alberta NDP. Outside of the NDP and UCP, no party received more than 4% voting intention amongst Albertans.

# **Detailed Findings**

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Just above one-third of Albertans believe the province is going in the right direction, whereas nearly sixin-ten are negative about the direction the province is headed; significantly more than in September 2023.

Those residing outside Edmonton and males are more likely to believe the province in headed in the right direction, while Edmontonians and females are more likely to report the opposite.

Belief that the province is heading in the right direction trends upwards with age. **34%** of Albertans believe that **things in the province are going in the right direction,** down directionally from 36% in September 2023


**CURRENT TRAJECTORY OF ALBERTA** 

Those residing outside Edmonton, those age 35+, and males are more likely to hold this stance.

59% 34% **59%** of Albertans believe that **things in the province are off on the wrong track**, up significantly from 50% in September 2023.

Those residing in Edmonton and females are more likely to hold this stance.

**8%** of Albertans report that they **"don't know" or** simply **refuse to answer.**

# ALBERTA ISSUES – MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED – TRACKER

Health care is the top issue facing Alberta today in March 2024, followed by inflation/ rising interest rates and housing prices/affordability.

No single issue experienced significant change in March 2024 relative to September 2023.

## **ALBERTA ISSUES – TOTAL IMPORTANCE: AIDED**

Healthcare was the overall top issue cited by Albertans, with nearly four-in-ten seeing it as the first or second most important issue the province is currently facing.


Inflation/rising interest rates and housing prices/ affordability are also important issues in Alberta, with just above one-third and one-quarter of Albertans respectively ranking these as top two issues facing Alberta today.



In your view, what is the most important issue facing Alberta today? What is the second most important issue?

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
#### TOP 6 AB ISSUES – MOST IMPORTANT:

#### AIDED x VOTING INTENTION (Mar 2024)







Only the United Conservative Party and the Alberta NDP are included in voting intention breakdown due to small sample size for other parties.




## **CURRENT LEADER APPROVAL RATING**

Albertans are close to equally split in their approval and disapproval of the Alberta NDP, while disproval exceeds approval for Premier Danielle Smith of the UCP.

The remaining four party leaders all experience higher disapproval rates than approval; though most Albertans report that they are "not sure" regarding these four party leaders.

#### worsened over the past six months. Greater than four-in-ten Albertans report their opinion of Danielle Smith has worsened over the last six months; a significant increase from September 2023. Danielle Smith also saw the largest drop in NET opinion, with the number of respondents indicating that their opinion of her has worsened being 21 percentage points higher than those who indicate it has improved. Despite this, she still leads all party



## **CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS**





## **PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS**

(Among Decided Voters)



Nearly half of Albertans report that they would vote for the United Conservative Party candidate were an Alberta provincial election held tomorrow.

The Alberta NDP received the second highest share of voting intention, with more than four-in-ten Albertans reporting that they would vote for a candidate from the party.

Just less than one-in-ten Albertans report that they would vote for a candidate from a party other than the United Conservative Party or the Alberta NDP were an election held tomorrow.

## APPROVAL RATING OF CURRENT GOVERNMENT ON ISSUES



Issue-centric approval ratings for the UCP government generally fall in the 20-40% range, depending on the issue, and are statistically consistent with results collected in September 2023.

No single issue received higher approval from Albertans than the 41% approval received by Premier Danielle Smith.

The proportion of Albertans who disapprove of the way Danielle Smith and the UCP is handling jobs/unemployment and the economy has increased in March 2024.



# APPROVAL RATING OF CURRENT GOVERNMENT ON ISSUES





Do you think Danielle Smith and the United Conservative Party have done a good job or a bad job handling each of the following issues in Alberta?

Housing prices/affordability, homelessness, health care system, poverty, taxes, and opioid/drug overdose/ toxicity crisis all received greater than 50% disapproval from Albertans.

A significantly greater proportion of Albertans disapprove of the way the UCP government has handled relations between provincial and municipal governments in Alberta, taxes, and homelessness in March 2024 relative to September 2023.

Two-thirds of Albertans support Pierre Poilievre's "axe the tax" campaign that aims to eliminate the carbon tax at the federal level, while less than one-quarter oppose it.

Those above age 35 are more likely to support and strongly support the campaign.

Those residing outside of Edmonton are more likely to support the campaign, while those who reside outside of both major cities are more likely to strongly support the campaign.



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
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
