BACKGROUND



Leger monitors constituents' views of BC government performance, party leadership, and voter intentions to keep a pulse on provincial political sentiment.

This wave of the study was done in partnership with Global Public Affairs.



METHODOLOGY



- Results are based on online research conducted among British Columbian adults 18 years of age and older.
- The most recent wave was conducted among a sample of 1,002, with fieldwork March 22-24, 2024.
 - No margin of error can be associated with a nonprobability sample, but for comparative purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error of +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was statistically weighted according to Canadian Census figures for age, gender, region, and education within the Province.
- Where available, results are compared to previous waves of research.

EXECUTIVE **SUMMARY**



As British Columbia gears up for the October provincial election, the latest Leger polling data indicates a sustained, substantial lead for the BC NDP under the leadership of David Eby, with a robust 43% of support among decided voters. This reflects a stable support base, despite the increase in vote share from the BC Conservatives.

BC United faces a formidable challenge as it attempts to recover from a decline in poll standings now at 18%, while the BC Conservatives experience a notable surge in voter support, standing at 26%. The rise of the BC Conservatives from a marginal choice to a serious contender is particularly evident in Metro Vancouver where 28% of decided voters prefer the BC Conservatives compared to just 19% support for the BC United. Additionally, the BC Greens are holding steady at 11%. Despite these evolving dynamics, the BC NDP sustains a generous lead as the province moves closer to election day.

"The surge in support for the BC Conservatives underscores the shifting political landscape in British Columbia, with John Rustad's leadership resonating particularly strongly among voters in Metro Vancouver, pointing to a possible shift in seat distribution," said Nicole Brassard, Vice President of Global Public Affairs.

Pierre Poilievre's "Axe the Tax" campaign to eliminate the carbon tax at the federal level reveals significant support among 56% of British Columbians, while 29% oppose the campaign. This comes on the heels of a 3% decline in the environment as the most important voter issue.


Housing affordability remains the top issue in B.C. (and has remained so since May 2016) followed by health care and inflation/rising interest rates, highlighting the current economic and social challenges facing the province. Notably, healthcare saw a 15% increase (from 40% to 55%) in total importance from September 2023 to March 2024 for those in the 55+ age group.


Most Important Issue Facing BC

Housing affordability continues to be the most important concern amongst British Columbians, Concern about health care has increased significantly relative to Sep 2023, while concern regarding inflation/rising interest rates increased only slightly over the same period.



Leader Approval Ratings

Approval ratings and opinion changes reveal Eby remains in a very strong position, despite the significantly increased levels of worsened opinion he has received of late. Conservative leader John Rustad continues the trend of increased approval ratings for his party.




Approval Ratings of Current Government on Key Issues


BC Voting Intentions


Voting intention for the current government is consistent with results from the last 2 waves, with the NDP still holding a strong lead. BC United continues their descent to a distant third place while the Conservative Party continues their gains, albeit at a slower rate.



DASHBOARD OF KEY METRICS







Key Findings

- The BC NDP have a comfortable lead at 43%, BC Conservatives 26%, BC United 18%, and BC Greens 11%.
- Support for the BC Conservatives continues to hold and leader approval ratings of Rustad have steadily risen.
- Notably, the BC Conservatives outperform the BC United in Metro Vancouver (28% to 19%) among decided voters.
- Those aged 35-54 are significantly more likely to believe that the province is off on the wrong track relative to those aged 55+.
- Housing affordability remains the top issue in B.C. (and has remained so since May 2016) and is followed by healthcare and inflation/rising interest rates. Healthcare is more likely to be chosen as the most important issue in March 2024 relative to September 2023.
- Over half of British Columbians support Pierre Poilievre's "axe the tax" campaign that aims to eliminate the carbon tax at the federal level, while less than three-inten oppose the plan.


Males and those aged 55+ are significantly more likely to hold positive views about the direction of the province.


Those aged 35-54 are significantly more likely to believe that the province is off on the wrong track relative to those aged 55+.

Those aged 55+ and males are significantly more likely to hold this view








BC ISSUES - MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED - TRACKER



Housing affordability remains the top issue in BC and is followed by health care and inflation/rising interest rates. Health care is more likely to be chosen as the most important issue in March 2024 relative to September 2023.

Outside the top 3 mentions; environment/climate change and wildfires are less likely to be reported as most important in March 2024 relative to September 2023.










Housing affordability remains the top issue in BC with more than four-in-ten respondents reporting it as the first or second most important issue the province is currently facing.

Health care and inflation/rising interest rates are also important issues in BC, with nearly four-in-ten citing health care and just under a third citing inflation/rising interest rates as top 2 issues.



BC ISSUES – TOTAL IMPORTANCE: AIDED




TOP 6 BC ISSUES – TOTAL IMPORTANCE:

AIDED x AGE (Mar 2024)










BC ISSUES – MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED Longer Term Tracking

Longer-term trending shows how much issues tend to bounce around over time as priorities, economic pressures, and issues shift in BC, though housing prices/affordability has consistently led all issues since May 2016.

The importance placed on health care has increased significantly since September 2023, and it sits behind only housing prices/affordability in importance.


Environment/climate change has decreased significantly in importance in the minds of British Columbians since September 2023.

CURRENT LEADER APPROVAL RATING






Premier David Eby remains the leader with the highest approval rating in March 2024 at 46%. 17% of British Columbians are unable to provide a rating, a directional decrease from 21% in September 2023, indicating that Eby continues to make progress in ensuring he is known to all British Columbians.

Furstenau and Falcon's approval ratings recovered slightly in March 2024 after falling directionally in the previous wave, while Rustad received significant increases in approval over the same period. While all leaders have made some level of progress in improving their awareness amongst British Columbians, a lack of familiarity continues to be an issue for Furstenau (35%), Falcon (27%), and Rustad (33%). Newcomer John Rustad has made the most recent progress in increasing awareness, with those who lack familiarity falling from 42% in September 2023 to 33% as of March 2024.





NDP voting intentions have been holding strong since the last wave and the party still leads all others by a strong margin.

Support for the BC Conservative Party continues to increase, though only slightly in March 2024, and they continue to strengthen their stable second place position.


BC United voting intention has declined slightly since Sep 2023, with the party falling further behind the surging Rustad Conservatives.

The BC Green Party continues hover around 10% support after experiencing a massive decrease in support in Jan 2023.



PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS x GENDER



PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS x AGE





(Among Decided Voters)








PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS X



FEDERAL VOTING INTENTIONS (Among Decided Voters)








PROVINCIAL VOTING INTENTIONS X


CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS

September 2023.


While the proportion of British Columbians whose opinions of John Rustad and Kevin Falcon improved increased significantly in March 2024, these improvements for both leaders were outpaced by even larger significant increases in worsened opinion.

All four party leaders have reported negative NET change in opinion over the last two waves.



CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS Longer Term Tracking of Parties
















Men are more likely than women to have strong opinions on the campaign and are significantly more likely to both strongly oppose and strongly support it.






