Method

Canadian online survey via Leger's LEO panel (n= 2,104/ 18 years or older and arrived to Canada in past 10 years)

When

December 14th, 2023, to February 16th, 2024

Margin of error


For comparison purposes, a probability sample of this size yields a margin of error no greater than ±2.1%, (19 times out of 20)

Weighting

Results were weighted by age, gender, region, country of birth, as well as years since arrival.

It was weighted to the 2021 Census profile of immigrants in the past 10 years to ensure a representative sample of the new Canadians.


Political Alignment





Which Political Party Do You Agree With Most?

Over two-in-ten newcomers typically agree with or lean closer to either the Conservative (24%) or Liberal parties' (22%) views, although over a third indicated that they are unsure about their party affiliations (38%).

Which Political Party Do You Agree With Most?



Opinion of Current Immigration Plan

Four-in-ten (42%) believe the government of Canada's current plan will admit too many immigrants into the country while a third (34%) believe it will admit the appropriate number of immigrants. Demographically, Quebec residents are much *less* likely to believe the current plan will admit too many immigrants (25% vs 45% across all other provinces) while those of Southeast Asian, Chinese, and South Asian ethnicities (64%, 55% and 50%, respectively) are *more* likely to believe this will be the case.



Demographic Profile


Understanding these demographic nuances is vital for engaging effectively with New Canadians. Notably, immigrants tend to be younger than the Canadian average, with the majority under 55. Despite higher education levels, newcomers often have lower income levels compared to the general population, pointing to the need for policies that better utilize their skills for successful integration.





Legal Status in Canada


3 in 10 newcomers are Canadian citizens, and 4 in 10 are permanent residents.





Languages Spoken

3 in 10 (29%) newcomers speak English as their first language, and 4 in 10 speak it most commonly at home. 1 in 10 speak French as their first language (10%) or at home (11%). Tagalog, Arabic, and Mandarin round out the top 5 languages spoken by newcomers.
