Government of British Columbia Report Card





BACKGROUND



Leger monitors constituents' views of BC government performance, party leadership, and voter intentions to keep a pulse on provincial political sentiment.

METHODOLOGY



- Results are based on online research conducted among BC residents 18 years of age and older.
- The most recent wave was conducted among a sample of 1,001.
 - No margin of error can be associated with a nonprobability sample, but for comparative purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error of +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was statistically weighted according to Canadian Census figures for age, gender, region, and education within the Province.
- Where available, results are compared to previous waves of research.

EXECUTIVE **SUMMARY**



More than three months after the October 2024 BC election, the latest Leger polling data indicates surprisingly little change in party support with the BC NDP maintaining its lead with 44% voting intention and the Conservative Party of BC following closely behind at 42%. With the recent resignation of Sonia Furstenau, the BC Green Party has seen a slight uptick in support, now reaching 10%.

Both BC NDP leader David Eby's and BC Green Party leader Sonia Furstenau's approval ratings have risen significantly since the election, with Eby at 49%, and Furstenau's at 38% likely due to the accolades & recognition she's received upon news of her stepping down. Despite the surge in popularity of John Rustad's party up through election night, approval ratings have remained stable, but the number of voters who say their perceptions of him as a leader have declined has risen from 20% to 27% indicating that some challenges have surfaced in this early stage of his term as opposition leader.

The recent decline in interest rates and drop in inflation numbers appears to have shifted the public agenda of the most important issue facing the province. Housing affordability had been consistently at the top of the charts for the past four years, but has slipped seven full points to one-in-five saying it's the most important issue. Our ongoing healthcare crisis has resulted in healthcare staying a firm 2nd in the list, while inflation has dropped from it's high of 19% four years back to the current level of 11%, and the tariff issue has made it's debut at 7% (data collection was prior to the announcement this past weekend)

BC residents have not noticed significant changes in the NDP government's approach to key policy areas since our last poll in August 2024, despite its election victory in October. Approval ratings for most issues have remained fairly steady as of our most recent read in January 2025, with slight increases in public approval for the government's handling of transportation and roads (+6%), federal relations (+6%), and homelessness (+4%--albeit ratings are dismally low on this particular file).

The NDP continues to receive its highest approval ratings for wildfire evacuations (53% approval), Indigenous reconciliation (47%), transportation (45%), and federal relations (45%). However, public disapproval ratings remain high (over 50%) in critical areas such as homelessness, the opioid crisis, poverty, housing affordability, taxes, crime, and healthcare.


Most Important Issue Facing BC

Significantly fewer BC residents chose housing affordability as the most important issue in BC in January 2025; however, it continues to be the most pressing issue in BC. This decline may be due to the rising concern over USA tariffs. Other major concerns such as healthcare and inflation/rising interest rates have remained stable over the same period.



Leader Approval Ratings

Public approval for BC NDP leader David Eby and BC Green Party leader Sonia Furstenau has grown significantly in January 2025. Eby continues to lead with a 49% approval rating, while Furstenau's rating has risen to 38%. Approval ratings of Conservative Party of BC leader John Rustad have held stable.



Approval Ratings of Current Government on Key Issues

The NDP government's handling of various issues has received mixed reviews, with wildfire evacuation response stands out as the only issue rated higher than Premier Eby's 49% approval.





BC Voting Intentions

Even with the BC United Party out of the picture following their withdrawal from the October election, voting intentions in January 2025 remain consistent with August 2024. The BC NDP retains its lead, with the Conservative Party of BC positioned closely behind.



The BC Green Party has seen a modest increase in support, now at 10%, which is not unusual to see postelections.







REGION (Among Decided Voters)










Public approval for BC NDP leader David Eby and BC Green Party leader Sonia Furstenau has grown significantly in January 2025 following the October 2024 BC election and the news of her stepping down as leader.


Eby continues to lead with a 49% approval rating, while Furstenau's rating has risen to 38%, marking her highest level in four years and placing her second overall.

In contrast, Conservative Party of BC leader John Rustad, whose approval ratings had been making steady progress since September 2023, has seen his approval rating stabilize in January 2025, resulting in his slip to third place.





LEADER APPROVAL RATING Longer Term Tracking





improved opinion.


The proportion of residents with an improved opinion of John Rustad has declined significantly, while those with a worsened opinion increased substantially with the differential showing a marked increase.

CHANGE IN OPINION OF LEADERS Longer Term Tracking of Parties







BC ISSUES – MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED – TRACKER

Significantly fewer BC residents chose housing affordability as the most important issue in BC in January 2025, reaching its lowest level in four years. However, it continues to be the most pressing issue in BC, with now just a slight edge over healthcare which has remaind steady.

Interest and inflation concerns are the lowest they've been in four years, while concerns about the the economy have risen. U.S. tariffs and trade sanctions have emerged as a growing concern for the province.





BC ISSUES – TOTAL IMPORTANCE: AIDED

Housing affordability remains the most critical issue in BC, with nearly four-in-ten residents considering it a top-two concern for the province.

Health care is also a major concern, cited by one-third of residents, while just above one-fifth name inflation and rising interest rates among their top-two concerns.




TOP 6 BC ISSUES - TOTAL IMPORTANCE:


AIDED x AGE (Jan 2025)

AIDED x VOTING INTENTION (Jan 2025)












BC ISSUES – MOST IMPORTANT: AIDED Longer Term Tracking

While public priorities in BC fluctuate in response to economic and social changes, housing prices and affordability has consistently remained the top issue since May 2016. In January 2025, however, significantly fewer BC residents ranked it as the most important issue.

Other major concerns have stayed consistent with August 2024 levels, suggesting that public priorities have remained relatively stable in recent months.







BC residents continue to view wildfire response, Indigenous reconciliation, and transportation as the areas where Eby's BC NDP government has performed best.












In January 2025, BC residents are more likely to approve the BC NDP government's work on homelessness.



More than half of BC residents feel the province is on the wrong track, while less than four in ten believe it is headed in the right direction.


Residents over the aged 55+ are much more likely to have a positive perception of the province's direction.

CURRENT TRAJECTORY OF BC


38% of BC residents believe that **things** in the province are going in the right direction, which has remained stable since August 2024 (39%).

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
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
